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Grant From Alcoa to Bring Big Changes At Society

The next couple of months are going to bring about a major change at the Historical Society headquarters. We have been notified that we have received a grant for \$6500 from the Alcoa Foundation. This money is going to be used to refurbish a room on the first floor to be used for accessioning items. Right now the accessioning process is sharing space with the office, the computer and the printers. The refurbished room will have insulated walls, a new ceiling and reinforced floor and additional outlets for computers and printers.

Work will begin slowly at first, but once we have closed for the winter the workers will be in the building full time. When we reopen next spring it will be exciting to see what changes and improvements have been made.

The Grove City Area Historical Society is very fortunate to have the support of the Alcoa Foundation. Without support such as this, the refurbishing of the headquarters would be a long process.

On Sunday, November 19, 2006, the Grove City Area Historical Society was presented a certificate by the Northwest Pennsylvania Hauntings Association stating that the headquarters at 111 College Avenue is haunted. The certificate indicates that the headquarters is a **CERTIFIED HAUNTED BUILDING**. This designation is the result of several late night vigils that used: EVP Audio, EMF Fluctuations, Digital Photos and Infrared Video. Numerous soundings were recorded plus many sounds ranging from a child's

giggle to footsteps to prolonged sighs.

The headquarters was built between 1905 and 1910. At that time it was called the Uber House. It had always been a hotel until the Historical Society took ownership in 1999. With so many people having stayed at the hotel, it is no wonder that there are spirits around.

The committee that is writing the next book on the buildings of Grove City is trying to find out information about the years from when the building was built to the mid 1940s when the Trepasso family took ownership. So far, no links have been discovered that could shed any light on the events and activities of residents and/or guests in the early years of the building.

From The Accessions Committee

This is an Edison electric egg cooker which was used in the Penn Grove Hotel at one time. It was recently donated by Ann Shannon. Probably dating from the 1930's, the egg cooker would lift the cooked eggs in the egg cups out of the water when the time was up. This and many other interesting and innovative historical items can be seen at the Society Headquarters museum. Beginning in 2007 there will be new hours for the museum and gift shoppe. GCAHS has a friend "Deep In The Heart of Texas"

The Grove City Area Historical Society has a new friend. It is Bob Humphreys from Houston, Texas. Bob is a native of Grove City and spent his professional career working for the Cooper Industry Corporation at various locations world wide. Bob was born in 1926 and went to Lincoln School for first through fifth grades. He lived at the corner of Chestnut and North Center Street. His favorite place to play was in the woods and swamps around Wolf Creek.

His father also worked for Cooper Industry, so when the family moved, it was always to a place where there was a Cooper facility.

Bob received his education at Otterbein and Tulsa Universities. He became an engineer for the company and continued the family tradition of working for Cooper Energy.

Bob has roots in Grove City that include the Fithian, Book, Kildoo, Riddle, Steindorf, Christy, and Emery names. His family homestead was in North Liberty. He has given us enough lineage that we will begin a geneology on the Humphreys name.

Why are we discussing this person who does not live here? He is putting together information on Cooper Bessemer. Considering the impact that the Bessemer Gas Engine Company has had on this community we have very little information or memorabilia. Bob is sending us as much information as he can put together.

You can bring items to the headquarters - 111 College Avenue - from 11 - 3 Tuesday through Saturday. We are open until the middle of December. We then close until the beginning of April. October is a busy month for the Grove City Area Historical Society. This is the time when students from the eighth grade at the Middle School come for a visit. This year close to 200 students toured the Headquarters. Their visit is part of a unit for their English class. They are to write an historical fiction story about someone or some event in the history of Grove City. As part of this unit, they visit the Presbyterian Cemetery on Greenwood Drive where Valentine and Margaret Cunningham are buried. Mary Sample spends a day with each class discussing interesting events, people, businesses, and historical facts of Grove City. The students then tour the Historical Society Headquarters to see the memorabilia that make up the many and varied displays.

Viewing the artifacts of Grove City is not only interesting to the students but encourages their interest in their own family heritage. As a result of this visit, students often come back to the headquarters to spend more time to look at the books and pictures in the library. Here they are able to find out information about their own families, see pictures of parents or grandparents in high school and/or college year books, and learn more about interesting events of the past.

Educating the youth of our community is one way to guarantee the continued interest in and appreciation of our heritage.
