ARCHIVIST

When I talk about all the activity that goes on at the headquarters during the winter, I am being very serious. In January I received a letter from Jonathan Riddle, a recent graduate of Grove City College, asking if we would be interested in having him work as an archivist. He had a proposal that he was going to present to Dr. Jewell for funding for this project. The board discussed the proposal at our January meeting and decided it sounded like a good idea, although we did not have any money to put into the project. If the College, however, wanted to fund this, great! Jonathan had worked at the headquarters last year transcribing the diaries of Ranals Craig, written when he was in the Civil War.

Jonathan went on his way, and I heard nothing for several weeks. One day, I received a call from Dr. Jewell. He had met with Jonathan and he was willing to give him \$7,000 toward his salary, if we could match the money. He also asked that the College be given copies of any material pertaining to them. Since we had no money allocated for such a project, he suggested I contact a benefactor. I told him we did not have one. He suggested I contact Joe Montelone. I contacted Joe and he agreed to give us the other \$7,000.

Jonathan arrived in town this week and is beginning work. He has been in contact with Judy Silva, who is an archivist at Slippery Rock University. She is helping him with the project. We have a lot of material that was given to us by the Ketler Family and Jonathan is going to begin with these holdings.

When you see the checking account balance, you will note that it is \$14,000+. That is because the \$7,000 from Grove City College has been deposited into the checking account.

We thank Grove City College and Joe Montelone for their support of this young man. This project will be a valuable asset to our holdings and to Grove City College.

SECOND FLOOR RENOVATIONS

If you studied the financial report carefully, you may have noticed that the "Second Floor Grant Account" has \$.60 in it. In other words, we are out of money to do any more work on the second floor, although there still are a lot of little things to be done to finish the rooms. Most of the rooms have a committee that is responsible for decorating and/or arranging items that have been donated. The people working on each room are having a good time. They arrive with scrub buckets, hammers, nails and ideas. Each room is unique.

We had a grant for \$25,000 to "do" the second floor. This meant dry-walling, painting, building displays, etc. One beautiful addition is in the Veteran's Room. We have oak display cabinets. The historical society paid for the material and Randy Voltz donated his labor to make the cabinets. They are wonderful.

Another interesting room is the Agriculture Room. Ed Zajak donated barn siding taken from the barn on Rt. 208W on the Benny and Joan Adams farm. We also have large murals on the walls that were donated by Prime Outlet. They had these murals in the food court. When they redecorated, they gave us the murals complete with the frames. Two of the murals are of farm scenes and are perfect for the room.



If you are interested in Grove City Sports, leave yourself a lot of time to spend in the Sports Room. Bill Gordon donated this room and has spent hours gathering information on athletes, both past and present. If someone from Grove City was an athlete, they are most likely in this room. If you have any sports memorabilia, newspaper articles, pictures, etc., it can be added to this area.

However, with \$.60 left in our account, we cannot do much more than organize what we have in the rooms. If you would like to make a donation to a specific room, we would be very grateful. The rooms are: Grove City College, Churches, Veterans, Community Organizations, Industrial, Grove City Schools, Local Businesses, a typical Hotel Room, Grove City Sports, Agriculture,

Scouting, Maps and Real Estate, as well as Men's and Women's clothing.

You are probably wondering what we did with all the money. Last summer a lot of work had to be done on the exterior of the building along the alley. The bricks had to be pointed, fascia replaced and new guttering put in place. This was necessary because water was coming through the bricks and into the second floor rooms. So, a lot of the money to redo the upstairs had to go on the outside.

If you are interested in making a donation to a specific room you may do so. DONATIONS MAY BE MADE TO THE GROVE CITY AREA HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND SPECIFY A ROOM.

THIRD ANNUAL SIDEWALK SALE

FINAL GRANT

This week we received what is probably our final grant. This one is from State Representative Dick Stevenson for \$20,000. The grant is for refurbishing the basement. We were relieved to have the grant come through since there are such big budget cuts. We were told that no grants were being honored except those that had signed contracts - and we had a signed contract. The money came through on Monday.

We have serious structural problems in the basement that must be addressed. Additionally we are going to cement the floor in one room, rewire parts of the basement and put a new ceiling in one room that we are turning into a classroom.

Of course, all this work getting done means we have to move "stuff" around. We are very thankful for the BARJ boys of George Junior Republic. They are our musclemen who move items upstairs and downstairs.

Over the years we have been fortunate to receive grants from Bob Robbins, Dick Stevenson and Alcoa Aluminum. Without all this financial support our museum would not be anywhere near as nice as it is now.

I think the main problems will have been addressed by the time this grant is finished, and we should be able to continue on with the maintenance of our building without major financial delays.

ARMSTRONG CABLE CHANNEL 19

A short time before Christmas, I had a phone call from Larry Berg of Armstrong Cable. He said that he would like to see our historical society as they were considering doing a feature on our museum. After meeting with him, he indicated they would like to do the show. It was taped just before Christmas but they decided not to run it until spring because we were closing the next week. They will be running the program sometime in the middle of April just before our opening. I do not have the schedule, however, they will be running the show several times a day for several days. They often run local programs around the dinner hour, so keep your eyes open. A week or so ago, they were once again in Grove City taking pictures of the Cunningham Wheel Display and our window. The program should be interesting and provide lots of good publicity.

“LEAVE A LEGACY”

Fiscal responsibility is a very big part of any successful organization. It is particularly important for our organization whose main source of revenue is membership dues. Of the many goals that we have, establishing financial solvency is the big one. Several years ago, the board voted to put \$100 a month, plus 10% of any fundraiser, into an endowment fund. At the same time, we also established an Executive Fund and put \$100 a month into that fund. This fund will someday be used to underwrite the cost of an Executive Director. When several hundred dollars accumulates in each fund, the monies are put into a CD. Recently, when CD rates dropped so low, we were frustrated because we were not earning any money on our investment.

An accountant suggested that we should invest our money with the GROVE CITY FOUNDATION. We explored this idea, only to learn that the Grove City Foundation was probably going to be merging with the Community Foundation of Western Pennsylvania. We met with Larry Haines, their Director, and Amy Atkinson, his Associate Director. We were impressed with them and their operation. As a result of this meeting, we established 3 funds with the Community Foundation. The purpose of the recently established ENDOWMENT and EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FUNDS is to give support to sustaining the mission of our organization. An individual can contribute to the historical society's ENDOWMENT FUND or EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FUND by giving an asset of value during your lifetime or through your Will. Your generosity leaves a legacy for our community. Our hope is to build both funds so that at some time in the future we can draw on the interest generated by these funds as a means of supporting our organization and hiring an Executive Director.
