WANT TO LEARN MORE ABOUT YOUR FAMILY HISTORY?


Volunteers at the Historical Society would be glad to assist you with genealogy research. Year round there are three people who can help you find out more about your ancestors here in Grove City, or elsewhere in the world. Don Cook and Jane Cleary are available two days a month at the headquarters when it's open – on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays. They can also respond to email or written requests at other times.

Cathy Coulter is our newest genealogy volunteer who can help you learn more about your family history. For extensive, in-depth searching, Cathy is also available for a consulting fee of \$15.00 an hour. She is able to assist with searching county court house land records and wills and she has extensive experience in researching immigration and Civil War records.

The Historical Society has a subscription to Ancestry.com, one of the world's largest databases for family research. It has US and state census records, online books, military collections, public member family trees, passenger lists, immigration and naturalization records, birth/marriage/death records, as well as 1 billion records from 15 countries outside the US. If you wish, our genealogy volunteers can help you learn how to search Ancestry.com at the headquarters and get you started in your own searching.

Cemetery records for Mercer County are also available at the headquarters. Family histories, donated by community members, are alphabetically arranged near the cemetery records in the front room. In addition, in the Historical Society library there are wonderful county histories, old street directories, books of local history, photograph albums, books by local authors, and old maps.

Visitors may search our Ancestry.com database for free whenever the Society is open, beginning Tuesday, April 16th, Tuesday – Saturday, noon to 3:00 pm. To request assistance, contact Jane Cleary, cleary2@zoominternet.net (or by phone at 724-748-3044).

Speaking about accessibility...we are getting closer to having an accessible way to get everyone transported to the 2nd floor display rooms! The cost is \$4,850.00. A portion of the John A. Sample memorial funds will be added to the \$1,000.00 seed donation we received last year. Additional donations will be gratefully accepted.

Plans are being made for Tom Armour to set up the Aluminum Room with \$4,000.00 of the donations received in memory of John Sample. Skip Sample is willing to contribute an additional \$500.00 if needed to complete the room for the display of the Grove City hammered aluminum pieces and an educational workshop area to demonstrate how it is crafted. Once this room is completed, we hope to have a chair lift down to the basement level. The expected cost of this lift is \$3,200.00. It will enable us to have accessibility to the lower level as we expand our use of that space. We have so many more stories to tell about Grove City's past!

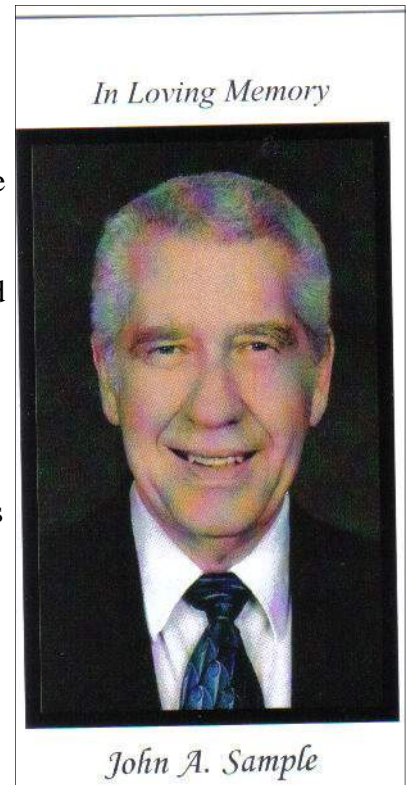

JOHN A. SAMPLE MEMORIAL

I am sure you all know December 7th is Pearl Harbor Day and was termed "A Day That Will Live in Infamy" by the President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. As my husband John and I were sitting having our morning coffee on December 7th we discussed this date. Little did we know that December 7th would become a day of infamy for us. This is the day my husband died peacefully in his chair as I was getting dinner.

Since we were not going to have a viewing at a funeral home, we decided that in lieu of flowers we would ask friends to make a monetary contribution to the Grove City Area Historical Society. As of this writing, over \$5,400 has been donated.

Our family discussed what to do with the money. We wanted to have a permanent memorial. One of the things being planned at the headquarters is an aluminum room in the basement. The cost of this room is projected to be between \$3,500 and \$4,500. John enjoyed and appreciated the hammered aluminum of the Grove City Area. He felt this should be the focal point of our museum since Grove City is the birthplace of the hammered aluminum industry. He was excited about the plans for this room. With this in mind our family decided to fund this room and have the room to be in his memory.



The money that is left over will go toward the installation of a chair lift to the second floor. A chair lift will cost \$4,850. Last year \$1,000 was donated to the Society as "seed money" for an elevator. A chair lift will serve the same purpose as an elevator but at a fraction of the cost. Any extra money needed for the chair lift will come out of Historical Society funds.

Michael, Joseph, Becky and I wish to thank everyone who contributed to the Historical Society in John's memory. We are honored by the response.

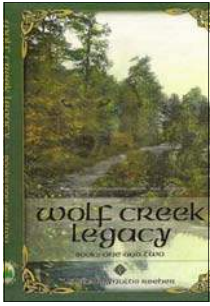

Wolf Creek Legacy TO BE AVAILABLE ONCE AGAIN



Wolf Creek Legacy I and II is a history of the Scots-Irish in our area, written by Lillian Reynolds Reeher, in the early 1980s while she was a writer for the Allied News. Lillian spent hours upon hours interviewing local folks who were in their 80s and 90s in order to write about life along Wolf Creek in an earlier time. Because the folks were descendants of generations who were native to the area, *Legacy* is the sole record of our area, written in the tradition of oral history.

Its pages hold dear the words of such respected people as J.H. "Smack" Montgomery, Sam Hunter, Orlo McCoy, Norman Crill, and Angie Forrest, to name just a very few.

Their stories give us the origin of Hunter Farm, Stewart Avenue, named for Angie's family, the hospitals, school, farms, mines, almost every aspect of the Grove City area as we know it now.

The historical society has been given permission by *Legacy's* copyright holder, Community Newspaper Holdings Inc., owner of Allied News, to republish *Legacy*. That will enable the society to bring to the public a very vital historical record, including the words and viewpoints of those many stalwart individuals who built our community and all it represents. This is important because there are no existing copies of *Legacy* for the public to buy. *Legacy I* went to two printings and both it and *Legacy II* sold out years ago.

The new edition will combine both volumes in a reasonably priced paperback with original illustrations. The final product will be of the quality we have come to expect with Curt Hazlett doing the layout as he did for the society's prior books, *The Way We Were* and *Grandma Left the Light On*.

Wolf Creek Legacy's significance and contribution to the area's written history is considerable, the scope of which may not be realized until even further into our future. It is hoped that Grove City Area Historical Society's members will be supportive of this valuable project.

130 YEARS AGO

This information was obtained from Ralph Packard's Grove City History "Annotated Timeline" on our website www.grovecityhistoricalsociety.org

January 24, 1883 Pine Grove was incorporated as the Borough of Grove City.

At the suggestion of J. T. Blair, General Manager of the Pittsburgh, Shenango & Lake Erie Railroad, the citizens voted to change the name of Pine Grove to Grove City to enable the post office and borough to have the same name. Another Pinegrove (now called Pine Grove), located in the southwest corner of Schuylkill County, had been incorporated in 1832. A petition of 91 Pine Grove citizens was presented to Mercer County Court in October 1882. On January 4, 1883, the court declared the area to be incorporated as Grove City. The population was estimated at 800.

In February the first election was held and Bascom Rayen Welch was elected the first burgess of Grove City.

The first council members were: R. S. Coulter, C. L. Fithian, J. W. McMillin, D. W. Morrow, A. B. McKay, and R. C. Craig, Secretary of Council.

On February 26, the first council meeting was held on in the Morrow carriage shop.

On March 3, a seal with a pine tree in the center was approved during the second council meeting.

On March 23, council levied a six-mill tax and directed the installation of wooden sidewalks along properties in the borough.

Note: These sidewalks were the object of college student mischief. As a practical joke, they would "roll up" the sidewalks. It is reported that on at least one occasion they were caught in the act by the college President Isaac Ketler, who supervised their relaying of the sidewalks.

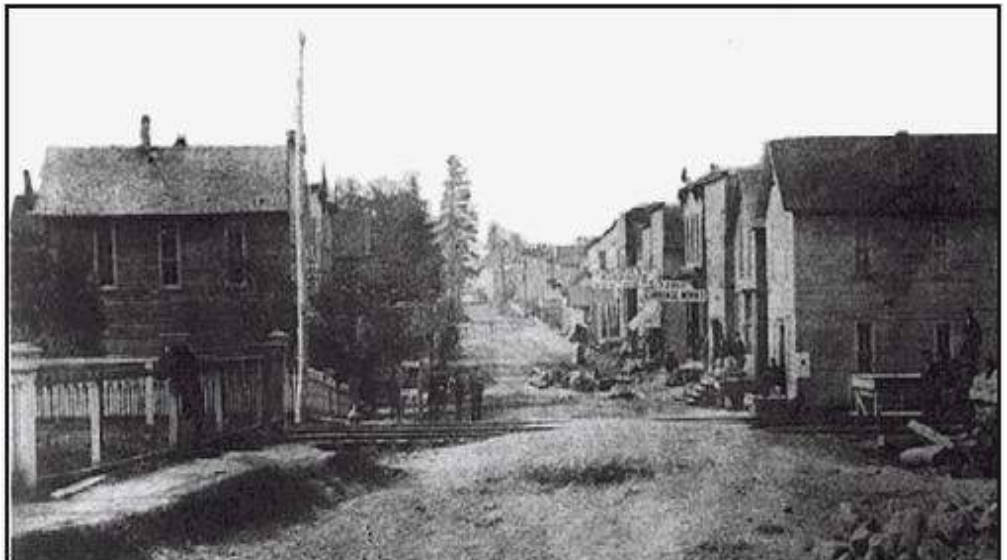
In 1883, William H. Egle in his The History of Pennsylvania still referred to Grove City as Pinegrove:

Starting from Shenango, on the line of the Shenango and Allegheny Road, eight miles hence, we have first the village of Fredonia, now seeking incorporation; then five miles further on, Oakland, near Mercer; then, five more miles, Pardoe's station, a mining town; then four miles and we reach Pinegrove - all thriving and prosperous villages.

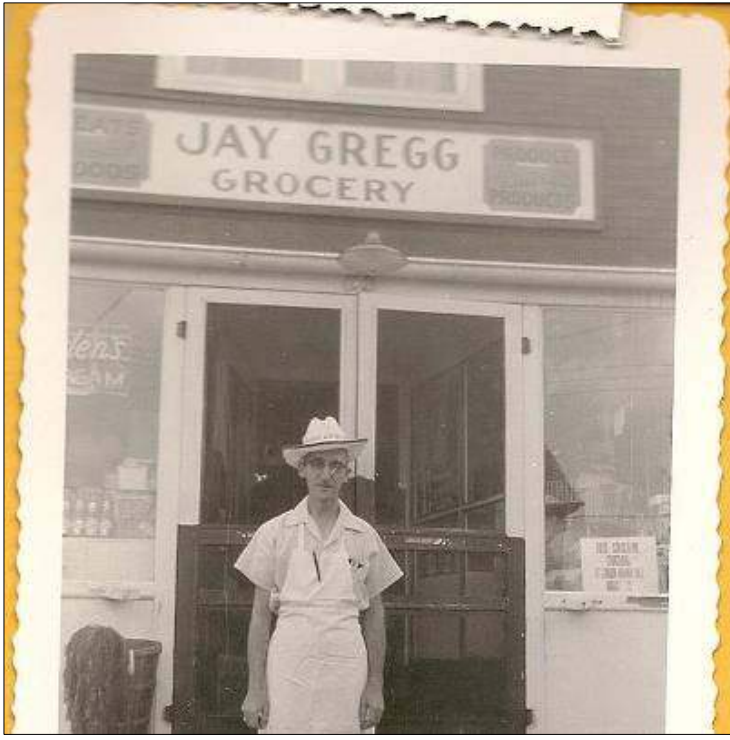
In 1883 Broad Street was an unpaved street.

This photograph shows Broad Street in 1883 looking south from the railroad tracks.

The Black Feed Store was the first building on the right. A sign is in front of A. B. McKay Carriage Works. Next was Livino Brothers & Co. clothing store. Their sign states "One Price Clothiers". Beyond that was the planing mill (about 151-153 South Broad Street). Beyond that was the Filer House. The first building on the left is the McNeish Building, which was razed in 1928 and replaced with a brick building. Beyond that was Fithian's Drug Store.
